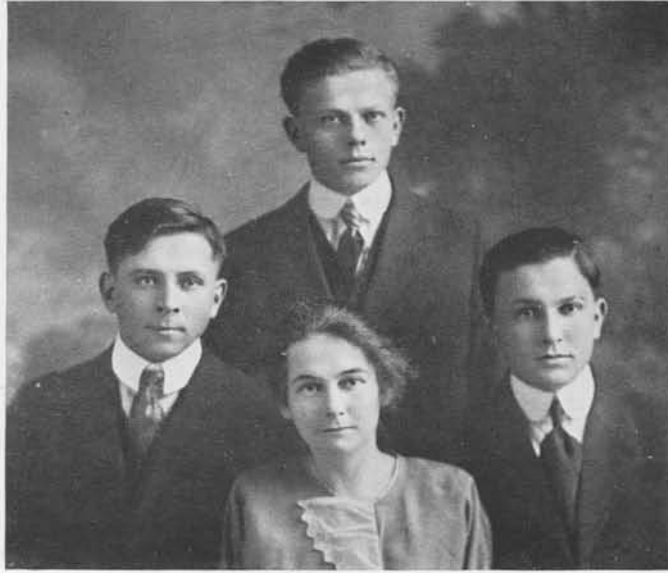


ADVANCED *and* TEACHERS' TRAINING

The Teachers' Training Course is now in its fourth year of existence as a separate course. The past four years have been years of record and achievement in the training of teachers. Teachers have been sent out to practically all of the northwestern counties of Minnesota, and they are teaching in rural, graded, consolidated and village schools. The success of the teachers graduating from the course has been due to the efficient, unselfish and wholesouled work of the instructor, Miss Grace B. Sherwood. The results of the last four years of work have given ample proof of the fact that agricultural training and rural school teacher training should go hand in hand if the right attitude toward country life is to be maintained.

The work of the Literary Societies and the Home Economics Club as well as the other school activities give the students excellent opportunity for training in social life.

The Advanced Course is now three years of age and has served and is serving a great field of usefulness. The object of the course is to prepare graduates of the regular courses and other qualified students for entrance into the Agricultural College and other colleges of the state. The school year of the advanced and teachers' training courses extends nine months, beginning the first week in September each year.

The students are required to take all of the academic subjects they need for entrance requirements and any additional time they have left is spent in taking courses offered as electives in the regular course. The social and economic possibilities and opportunities of country life are taught by Superintendent C. G. Selvig in the courses of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology. Solid and plane geometry are both made plain under the instruction of Mr. A. H. Larson; the respective values of a, b, x, y, and z are taught in an efficient manner by Mr. J. P. Bengtson, in the course of advanced algebra. History, English, and literature have all become live vital subjects, and are looked forward to by the Advanced and Teachers Training students.
