

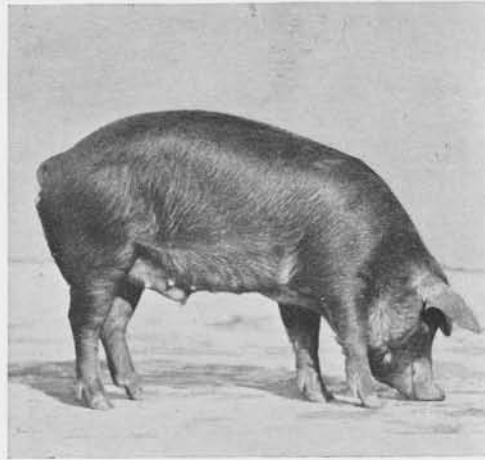

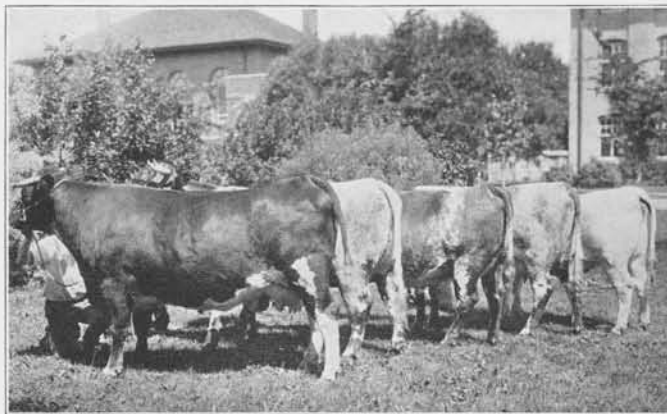
The station livestock has won recognition in the show pavilion. The first silver trophy offered by the Red River Valley Livestock association for the best beef herd shown at the Red River Valley Winter Shows, was won by the station Shorthorn herd on three different occasions. This trophy is now the permanent property of the station. A similar trophy offered for the best sheep

flock shown at the Winter Shows has been won three different times by the station Shropshire flock. These winnings have been made against strong competition by breeders of the Red River Valley. A class of three Duroc-Jersey spring barrows bred and raised at the Northwest Station, won first and third as individuals and first as a pen of three Duroc barrows at the 1923 International Livestock Show. Above is shown a cut of the Reserve Champion Duroc-Jersey barrow at the 1924 International Livestock Show.

The courses of study offered in this department are types and breeds of stock, stock judging, herd management, farm dairying, feeds and feeding, animal breeding, pedigree work, livestock equipment, meat slaughtering and cutting, animal diseases and sanitation. Students also become familiar with market requirements and market requirement demands for livestock.
