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ALL STUDENTS at the Northwest School are encouraged in carrying on practical work at home during the summer months under the direction of the school faculty. Direct individual assistance is given each student by the various instructors in planning the work before the student leaves the school in the spring, by visiting the student and inspecting the project during the summer months, and by checking up the project records when the student returns to school in the fall. At the annual home project exhibit at the school in November, each student makes an exhibit of products grown or made during the past season.

The most popular projects for boys are corn and potato growing, pure seed production, alfalfa, soybeans, farm accounts, tractor operation, windbreak planting, poultry, sheep-raising, and dairy management. In girls' work, each girl selects three or more projects from a list of fifteen approved subjects. These include practice in canning and preserving foods; baking, cooking, and serving; designing and dressmaking; and embroidery, hemstitching, and crocheting.

Demonstrations in canning, baking, sewing, and millinery are given by teams of girls in the school assembly, at community farmers' clubs, county
