


FACULTY



E. R. CLARK, B.S.A., Pure Seed Specialist, Home Project Leader, and Assistant in Agronomy, is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, College of Agriculture. He joined the staff of the School and Experiment Station in 1920. The careful and extensive distribution of pure seed in the Valley by Mr. Clark during the last five years has been a noteworthy achievement. During the summer, he visits about 100 farms in the Valley to inspect fields for certification as representative of the Minnesota Crop Improvement Association and also visits the homes of those students engaged in project work. Before coming to Crookston, he taught high school agriculture. Mr. Clark makes his home on the campus.

SUBJECTS: Cereal Crops, Farm Accounts.

R. S. DUNHAM, B.S.A., Assistant Professor of Agronomy and Agronomist, who is the head of the farm crops department at the Northwest School and Station, is a graduate of the University of Illinois. He came to the Aggie School in 1921, after a varied and successful experience as soil analyst, conducting his own laboratory; independent land appraiser and farm management expert; agriculturist for a large farm colonization company in Wisconsin, and as college extension worker at the University of Illinois. He is the organizer and secretary of the Red River Valley Crops and Soils Association and superintendent of the Farm Crops Show of the Red River Valley Winter Shows. For three years he has been a grain judge at the Minnesota State Fair. He is a musician of real ability both on piano and, in these later days, on the saxophone. Last, but not least, he and Mrs. Dunham are our efficient and sympathetic class advisers. His home is on the campus.

T. M. McCALL, B.S.A., Assistant Professor of Horticulture, is a graduate of Iowa State College of Agriculture. He joined the staff of the Northwest School and Experiment Station in 1911. Mr. McCall is head of the Horticultural department. He owns and operates a farm in the Red River Valley. At Ames, he was a prominent debater and at the Northwest School this training has made him particularly capable as adviser for the literary societies and debating teams.
