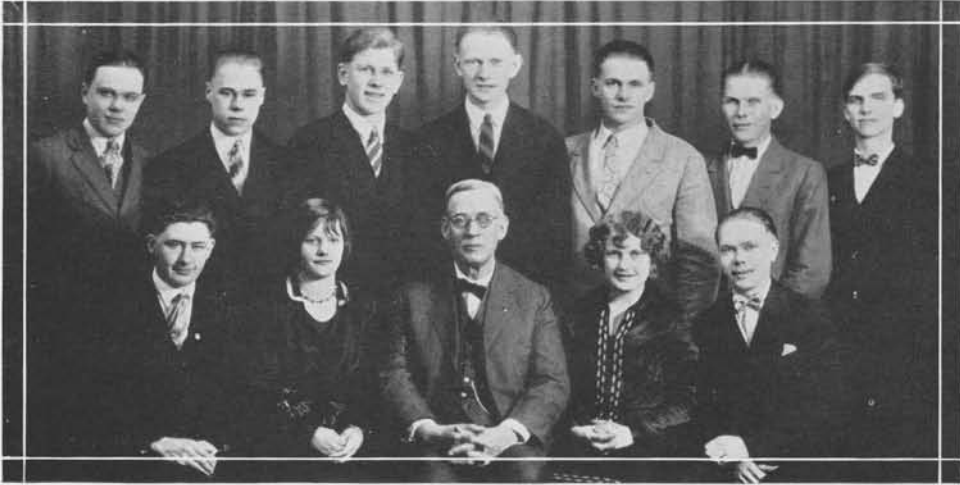


## Debate
