When the curtain was rung down on the 1929 football season the Northwest School gridiron performers were the possessors of a record of two wins, two losses and two ties besides establishing a reputation as a fighting team that battles from the opening kickoff to the final whistle.

The first football call was issued on the opening day of school and forty men reported for the initial practice. Eight letter-men were among the squad that greeted R. J. Christgau, newly appointed coach at the school, and with the first game scheduled five days after the first meeting Coach Christgau and his men began intensive work immediately.

It was a fighting team that represented the school on the gridiron, and the pep, dash and enthusiasm displayed by the players reflected on the student body and football spirit was at a high pitch on the Aggie campus. The team gained a victory in the opening struggle with Red Lake Falls, but suffered reverses in their next two encounters with East Grand Forks, and the Morris Aggies. Homecoming Day produced a tie game with Park Region Luther College team of Fergus Falls and this was followed by a victory over Model High School of Grand Forks. The final game of the season was played with Thief River Falls and resulted in a tie. During the season the Aggies scored eighty-one points to their opponents thirty-two.

Following the close of the regular schedule students turned their attention to the annual class games and many fine prospects for the 1930 season were uncovered.
