Home Project Work

Home projects may be defined as school activities carried on by our students during vacation months. Projects selected by the girls consist of work along Home Economics lines. This gives them a chance to put into practical use, knowledge gained in their clothing and foods work during the school year. The boys select work in pure seed production, farm accounts, livestock feeding, shop work, plant and weed identification, tractor management, and kindred subjects, all designed to give them further training in the management of the farm.

Project work also aids in keeping the student in touch with school during the months at home, for school supervisors visit all who are enrolled in the work, inspect their projects, and offer help and suggestions. As a climax to the summer's work an annual Home Project Show is held in connection with Parents' Day, when all projects that can be brought to school are displayed. Ribbons are awarded the best exhibits, which insures keen competition and makes the event very interesting and instructive. The student having the best exhibit in the show is also awarded a championship ribbon. Highest honors in the 1931 show went to Agnes Eggen in the girls' division and Emil Hoppe in the boys' division.

To stimulate greater interest in Home Project work, silver trophies are presented to the girl and to the boy having the best record in their summer work. These awards for the summer of 1931 were won by Margaret Gault and Emil Hoppe, with Agnes Eggen ranking second in the girls' division and Paul Sorenson second among the boys.
