

## Junior-Senior Banquet

The Junior-Senior banquet and promenade, given by the Class of 1934 in honor of the Senior graduates on Monday evening, March 6, was considered one of the most successful in the history of the Northwest School.

The general motif for the evening was "Spring."

Under the direction of Miss Elsie Mae Kingston, adviser, the Juniors transformed the dining hall into a spring garden. The gaily colored drapes were drawn over the windows. The room was lighted by Japanese lanterns. Overhead lights were softened by vari-colored streamers. The great fireplace was banked with fern.

Against the dark wood of the mantel, tall yellow tapers and baskets of daffodil were arranged. The orchestra was secluded in a white arbor covered with spring flowers. In the corners of the room were potted pepper trees and large, brightly colored amaryllis.

The tables, arranged to form a 33 in honor of the graduates, were lighted by yellow candles in small, green wooden holders. The tables were strewn with smilax. At each place was a nosegay and a decorative program.
