Track Team

For the first time in the history of the school, a cross country team was organized. The squad began to practice during the second week of school in preparation for a meet with Bemidji Teachers' College, to be held at the time of the football game on October 20. About a dozen boys reported for the squad.

The Bemidji team arrived with boys who had had more or less experience in college and high school track competition; so our boys were naturally rather discouraged over the prospects of winning any points. The race was run at quite a disadvantage as a strong northwest wind was blowing which the boys had to fight for almost half a mile. When the final score was checked, it was determined that Bemidji had beaten us by

only one point, having won 1st place and 4th and 5th, whereas our team was successful in winning 2nd and 3rd with Clifford Homstad and Perry Borgie in these positions, and Orbin Thompson and Alvah Rowley coming in 6th and 7th. On the whole the outcome was very successful and the boys put up a very good fight against superior competition.

This year's experience indicates that the student body is interested in this new inter-school activity and every effort will be made in the future to continue it. It is hoped that arrangements can be made to meet at least one of the Schools of Agriculture. All except one of the boys on this year's team will return next fall, so a strong team is assured.

Football prospects for 1933 were dimmed somewhat by the loss of last year's fullback, Ed Widseth, who graduated to attend the University, but early in the season it became evident that many of the squad members had special abilities that could be used to work out the problem of winning games. Stanley Alseth showed ability as a punter and with Captain Reese's hard hitting speed and the pass-catching ability of Elmer Ross, a recruit, all directed by a new quarterback, Theos Moreck, a well-balanced offense appeared probable.

The opening game of the season with the Concordia Freshmen proved a very satisfactory prepara-

tory game, although we lost, especially since one of our former Aggies, Lawrence Elton, was instrumental in scoring two of the opponent's touchdowns. He played a great game on both offense and defense.

On October 14 the Aggies again met the University of North Dakota Freshmen who were faster and bigger than ever this year. Though beaten by a large score, a few outstanding accomplishments resulted from this game. Pass defense was strengthened and defensive tackles received invaluable experience in trying to stop the Freshmen off-tackle plays.
