Home Project

Since the beginning of the history of the Minnesota schools of agriculture, home project work has been an important feature of the curricula. During the six months following each academic year, students engage in projects in various phases of agriculture or home economics, under the supervision of the faculty. These projects are planned in conferences between students and faculty and are supervised by home project instructors, who visit the farms and homes from time to time during the summer.

During the season of 1934, home economics projects in progress included practically every

phase of sewing, baking, preserving and other household arts. Agricultural projects involving the development of disease-free potatoes, pure seed grain production, farm tractor cost records, sheep and swine raising, and weed identification and control were carried on by nearly every student. On Parents' Day, November 3, the annual exhibit of home projects was held in the gymnasium. At the annual Awards Assembly, December 15, silver trophies were awarded to two students who had made the highest achievement in home economics and agriculture respectively and achievement ribbons were presented to those receiving honorable mention in each department.
