

Senior Class History

The class of '36 was first organized in the fall of 1933 with an enrollment of 87. At our first class meeting Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Christgau were chosen to act as our class advisers. The class chose as our class flower the forget-me-not, and royal purple and gold as our class colors. "Climb tho the rocks be rugged" has been our class motto through our three years of existence. Roland Wentzel was elected our first class president.

During our freshman year we naturally took part in all events of school life and had representation on many of the school teams. We also participated in all inter-class activities. In the inter-class song contest held in December, the Seniors won first place to their own great satisfaction and delight. Through the year in our class work and extra-curricular activities we have put forth our best efforts to justify the trust which our parents and faculty have placed in us. We have labored to produce an Aggie that will truly represent our progress at this institution. Our class has been well represented on school teams, and we are proud of the records our classmates have made. And then, with graduation,

for some of us our school days at the Northwest School come to an end.

To Mr. and Mrs. Christgau, whose competent guidance has been largely responsible for our progress during the past three years, we, the Seniors, wish to extend our heartfelt gratitude and best wishes.
