

Library Is Learning Hub

The fastest growing institution at the college is the library in Kiehle Hall, which is dedicated to the proposition that all men are created to learn. The shelves now house some 6000 volumes, and more are ordered regularly. The library also subscribes to more than one hundred periodicals on subjects ranging from agricultural research to athletics and to metropolitan newspapers as well as small town weeklies.
